There can be no blinking of the fact that for the present at anyrate Afghanis tan has been reconquered by the native tribes. The evacuation of Cabul by the British is a serious and ominous confirmation of native successes. This is most inglorious sequel to Gen. Roberts' rapid march upon and easy capture of Cabul, soon after the massacre at the Residency. The worst fears are entertuned in some quarters as to impending British disaster, including a repetition of the bloody scenes of 1842. It is to be hoped that the still hopeful view taken of the situation by the Vice Roy of India may turn out to be well founded, and that the tide of victory may soon again turn in favor of the British flag and forces. Meantime it has to be said that much more danger, disaster and disgrace tian glory have accrued to the British arms in this semi-savage war as well as in that in South Africa, The blunders of the village of Madoc. and the reverses of both these wars of conquest will add materially to the heavy indictment which will confront the Beaconsfield Cabinet during the coming elections in Great Britain.

The Tory leaders in Canada are in one sense quite consistent in professing a solicitude for and promising protection to manufacturers. In fact they are in a sense manufacturers themselves. John Macdonald and Sic Stretcher Tupe per were assiduously engaged for a couple of years before the elections in manufacturing popular discontent in regard to the depression, and unjustly saddling the Government of the day with the responsibility for it, and creating capital for themselves and party out of the public misfortunes. And now, in the same sense but in the opposite direction, Sir Samuel Tilley is trying his level best to talk the people into a belief that they are prosperous and happy, and that his precious 'N.P. has been the cause and source of all the change. There is as yet no genuine improvement in the condition of the people. Things were not as bad as they were depicted by the then Opp si tion leaders under the Liberal regime. Neither are they now anything like as auspicious as the protectionists would have the people believe. The difference has been simply between Tory disparagement then, and a flattering exaggeration now, of the actual state of affairs. The country will gradually recover from the prostration of the depression, but no thanks will be due to those who traduced its good name to help themselves into power, and who impudently claim that their return to office has hastened the revival of better times. ___
