WORKING UP THEIR SCHEME,

DELEGATES ARRIVED - GIGANTIC WESTERN PROJECTS - A WATER HIGHWAY THROUGH ONTARIO.

(Montreal Witness.) The Peterborough delegation, representing the promoters of the Trent Valley Canal scheme, are here to-day. This forenoon they had an interview with Mr. Henry Lyman, President of the Me treal Board of Trade, to whom they fully explained the nature of their project for initing the Georgian Bay and Lake Ontario by water. The extraordinary number of little lakes connected in many cases to each other by rivers in Peterborough and Victoria Counties and the

neans by which the two great lakes referred to might be united were pointed out to-day to the representatives of our commercial boards. The promoters of this scheme are not so ambitious as Mr Capreol, the promoter of the Huron and Ontario ship canal, a rival project having for its object the construction of a highway for ships through that great stretch of country, which includes the York Ridges, between Lake Simcoe and Toron The Peterborough idea is a highway 000,000, as against Mr. Capreol's scheme of a ship canal, the cost of which would be any way from \$25,000,000 to \$60,000,

The delegation will formally meet the council of the Board of Trade to-morrow afternoon, when representatives of the press will be admitted. The delegation which is composed of Measrs. Carnegie, of the Peterborough Review, and Mr. Keeler, of Colborne claim that their canal scheme will shorten the distance between Chicago and Montreal some hundreds of miles, and that

his is the cheapest way of connecting the vaters of Lake Huron with those of Lake Outario. Taking the route projected from the Georgian Bay to the Bay of Quinte, according to the surveys of Government engineers 136 miles are favigable, 59 miles of canal must be conwater are to be overcome. The proposed highway passes through the counties of Hastings, Northumberland, Peterboro Victoria, Ontario and Simcoe, and wil include Rice Lake and lakes Chemong Buckhern, Pigeon, Sturgeon, Cameron, Balsam, Simcoe and Couchiching.


