We are glad to hear of the strong probability that Mr. Maclennan will again oppose Dr. Bergin for the representation of Cornwall in the House of Commons. but for Bergin's corruption Mr Maclennau would have been elected without doubt on the 17th Sept , 1878. Now that the constituency has been reopered by the unseating of its late member the prospects of Mr. Macleman's success are excellent. Nothing can pre vent his triumphant election, but Liberal maction or the reperpetration of the bribery to which Dr. Bergin owed his questionable success at the last election. _____

The prospective candidates on both rides in the coming Presidential contest in the United States are playing the card of dignitied reluctance. Gen. Grant result, but signifies that if tendered to him, especially if importunately pressed upon him, he will not refuse the nomination. Similarly it is said of the Hon Horatio Seymour that he will not decline a unanimous nomination by the Democratic party, although he would not con sent to become a candidate in the ordi nary sense of the term. How would do for the politicians and electors generally to emulate this dignified neutrality "nd, beyond depositing their ballots, to take no active part in the election. Such an experiment is extremely unlikely indeed impossible with our politically mercurlal neighbours, but it would be perfectly reasonable for them not to get excited in a matter about which ever the candidates themselves affect to be so s .blimely indifferent.

The public will soon lose all heart in the applause and support of sport from the constantly transpiring fact that the whole thing is being utterly divested the faintest vestige of honorable competiti n. The Chautaugua fiseco between Hinlan and Courtney did much to weaken the public confidence in a sphere of athletic excellence which was popularly, but fallaciously, supposed to be entirely free from crooked manipulation. Of pedestrianism, as latterly conducted, even its ment innocent and enthumastic parrons could not reasonably hope to escape be ing duped. No surprise will be excited, therefore, by the rumours that the last rix day's walk in New York was a wellp'o'ted sham throughout, and that it was nyed from the first as to who should be the winner in-the contest. When six diva continuous and almost a sleepless ordeal of this character necessarily in volves so much violence and cruelty to the constitutions of the competitors we don't wonder that a dishonourable collu aton is resorted to to mitigate the self-tor ture. The gaping multitudes who take stock in such brutal exhibitions deserve to be sold. At the same time the facthat they have been duped will go far, we abould say, to cure them of the craze and so help to abate the pedestrian nuisano or at least to shear it of its more objectionable and fraudulent features.

A CASE OF HARDSHIP.

The persecutors of Mr. Wheeler ex M. P. for North Ontario, have not yet encceeded, as they had hoped, in sealing beyoud redemption his fate of disqualification. The offence which cost him his seat, and on which Mr. Justice Armour disqualified him, was a very trivial one. It consisted of d fraying the travelling expenses incurred by a speaker at one of his meetings. This is certainly a venial political offence for which the punishment of disqualification is far too severe a penalty. It may, indeed, bring the caudidate within the letter of the election law, but certainly no personally corrupt motive has been proved in the case so far as Mr. Wheeler himself is concerned.

far as we can see there was far more 'corruption upon the other side, and had Mr. Wheeler been as corrupt as the black-mailers demanded of him he would to this day have remained in undisturbed possession of his seat.
