LAKE OPENICON CASE.

THE INVESTIGATION OF THE ALLEGED IN-

FANTICIDE—DEATH FROM NATURAL

CAUSES.

On Tuesday afternoon (it was intimat-

ed yesterday) Coroner Shaw and P.

C. Hinde left the city to investigate

a case of infanticide, which was

alleged to have occurred at Lake

Opénon on a recent date. The

representatives of the justice

left here at 1 o'clock, and pro-

ceeded as far as the Frontenac

Lead Mines where a half-hour

halt was made. The mines

are about ten miles from the

lake, and at this point the

report in connection with the

infanticide was made known to

the coroner and jury. On

Monday morning P. C. Hinde

preceeded the coroner and a

half for the purpose of

summoning an jury and col-

lecting the evidence to be

used at the inquest. It

committed suicide, and
