A very marked improvement for 1871 is reported in the business of New York, and, generally, throughout the United States, as compared with the operations of the preceding year. There is far more popular liberty in Canada than jo the United States. Here a simple majority of the people is always the governing power, and the will of that majority for the time being is supreme With our neighbors the case is very different. If the executive head of the nation chooses to differ from the wish of the people, as expressed by their representatives, all he has to do is to plant the foot of his veto upon it and the thing is quashed unless the popular cause or question can command a two to one majority in the House. As this is hard to get the President is virtually master of the situation, as the cases of Andrew Johnson and R. B. Hayes and other minority Presidents have proved. 'Tis true our neighbours elect their possible despot themselves, but once chosen they are for four years at his mercy, and have no control over either him or his Cabinet which, unlike ours, is not amenable to parliament or people but is personally selected by the President himself and responsible only to him. No such power is invested in the British Monarch even, nor in his Canadian Vice-Roy, who is indeed only the figure-head and mouthpiece of the people's Govern-Our view on this question is that Canadians will be satisfied to remain as they are as long as possible; that failing this, it some change should become necessary, they would vastly prefer Imperial Federation to local independence, and that in any case they never will go in for

WINCHESTER TRAGEDY

Mr. Robert Brown Acquited of the Charge of Murder
