LONDON LETTER,
(Regular Correspondence.)
Considerable interest attaches to a
question which has just been put to a
Sheffield worker in ivory. He declares he
knows whether elephants shed their tusks,
as it is not generally known that they
shed more than once a year, and that he
had killed and seen the tusks of a
sheep which he had killed to supply
his manufactory alone with the ivory
used last year. The answer to his query
is, unfortunately, that before the tusks
are obtained an elephant must be
slaughtered, and hence is found a
subject for very serious reflection. Num-
bers of elephants are killed by means
so plentiful as they were a few years ago,
and without doubt existing in large
numbers in certain parts of Africa, the
elephant is, however, rapidly disappear-
ing. As a beast of burden he is unrivalled
for strength, endurance and intelli-
gence, and the service he renders in times
of war, as well as in peace, would alone
more than reward a cruel effort on his
behalf. Quite apart from the fact that
when he goes, the supply of ivory ceases
to be, there is also the grave consideration
of his loss as a means of locomotion and
transport. It is well known that he
does not breed in captivity, and it is
therefore, only in a wild state that the
species can be preserved. The destruction
of more than twelve hundred of his
kind for one knife-making firm implies
a high and serious loss to the world.

That the cause of knowledge shall not
suffer for want of energy is the sincere
desire of every sensible person, but the
preceding reported from the Lambeth
Police Court on Saturday show that it is
possible for even the quality of educa-
tional benevolence to be a little strained.
Upwards of eighty criminals to prison
were signed affecting parents who had not
succeeded in paying fines inflicted upon
them for non-attendance of their children
at school. The case of one of these
was summoned appears exceptionally
hard. More than thirteen years of age,
and sufficiently taught to have passed the
fourth standard already, he is in a
situation when he rarely sufficient money
to make his sole stay or support of his
family. Without his aid his relatives
must apply to the parish for assistance -
they cannot support themselves. Very
naturally the Mayor remonstrated with
the Inspector who asked him to force the
boy to quit work at the school once
more, and suggested that in such cases
attendance upon evening instruction
would be sufficient. The representative
of the Board would not, however, be
satisfied by any such argument, and in
the end the case was adjourned to the
magistrate in the hope that some way might
be found out of the difficulty.

Billingsgate market has at length been
invaded by Canadian produce. A motu-
ary of two or three tons of salmon,
recently arrived from the Dominion,
made their appearance on the quays of
the Thames. Frozen by artificial process
before being put on board ship, they were
found, on reaching the London market,
to be in admirable condition and ap-
parently fit for the table. Amongst them
were probably specimens of the beautiful
fish which crowd the famous Restigouche
stream, and, so such salmon has entered
the metropolis as has not been seen
before. According to the relations of
those who have brought the cargo
here, the cost when delivered will be lit-
tle more than a third of that which comes
from Holland. And presuming that such
ventures are found to be a success, there
is no reason why any quantity should not
find its way to these shores. Those, how-
ever, who participate in the benefit which
such an increase of supply brings will not
be likely to grumble, for the Canadian
salmon has no superior in the world for
flavour and richness.

SPALDING'S GLE'S split on a chair, from
getting up easily.

On the 6th Nov., seven men brought
in by Gen. Gough's force from Shum-
gardan and intermediate villages were
hanged, one being a hawilder of a Herat
regiment present in Cabul. The hang-
ings were followed by an execution
at the Chard Valley, the village
of which were known to be harboring dis-
abled sepoy. Taking the road
through the northern suburbs of Cabul,
the troops passed through the gorge by
which the river enters the city, and then
turned sharply across the stream and
followed the foot of the hills until near
the village of Ludikes.

The mullock, or headmen, were sus-
pected by Gen. Gough of having ordered
them to bring out all sepoy of the Af-
ghan army. Five minutes grace was al-
lowed, and within this time thirty men
came forward. The General had a roll-
call, showing the names of the sepoy
known to him, or he hid in Ludikes,
and as many of these were missing the
mullocks were asked to explain their
absence. They admitted that twenty men
were absent, but promised to bring them
in when they were ready. Ludikes had
distinguished itself particularly by firing
at our cavalry patrol before Charatib,
and by receiving within its walls the fugi-
tive who fled from the attack of the
Seyid and Highlanders and Fifth
Regiment on the 24th of October, and on
the day of the fight. A sum of 1,500
maunds (120,000 pounds) of grain, and
900 loads of bhooza (chopped straw for
fodder) was levied, and the whole popula-
tion destroyed.

General Blesker then visited smaller
villages near and captured 18 more se-
poy. There could be little doubt that
most of them had been trained as sol-
diers. They fell into their places,
shoulder to shoulder, and kept time to
the quick step of the Sikhs, marched
along in good order to our camp. Forty
more sepoy were brought in by the
mullocks on the 9th and 10th, as well as a
kafir, who had been a soldier in the
army of the late King of Cabul. This
made 59 in all, and they have been dealt
with as follows:

Nov. 10th 1879 11
Nov. 11th 28
Nov. 12th 10
Total 49

49 men who could show by fact evi-
dence that they were absent from Cabul,
living sick in their villages or otherwise
engaged when the mutiny and after
events took place, were released. Many
did not attempt to deny their presence in
the hills. Hassan and Chharatib were
scores (involved by others were tested by
the statements of the mullocks, and I ex-
amined independently. Confirmed
fidelity with their headmen, and the false-
ness of their defence exposed, these
prisoners did not make the trouble to in-
vent further explanations.

The men executed belonged to the
Herat regiments. They were either at
Cabul when the outbreak occurred, or
returned later to fight against us, the
muster rolls roll up their names, and we
ought to identify them without much
trouble. They did not attempt to give
false names, and their mullocks were
warned that they themselves might incur
further punishment if they screened se-
poy belonging to their villages. Each
could not give a clear account of their
movements were condemned to death,
and they submitted to their fate with
the usual quiet resignation of Musul-
mans. Many were of the worst type of
fighters, and their execution was a
warning to their comrades who were
waiting their turn at the foot of the scaffold (ten men were hanged at a time) was
remarkable.

The trial of the Argeatoul controverted
case upon the merits was commenced and
concluded here to-day before Mr. Justice
Belanger. Mr. R. McIntyre, of Gren-
ville, and Mr. Thomas J. Higginson, of
Ottawa, both Counsel for the Crown,
evidence that Higginson promised to pay
McIntyre an old account of \$25 to in-
fluence him, which the respondent's counsel
admitted as sufficient to void the election
on a strict interpretation of the electoral
law. The election was accordingly voided.
Much indignation is felt at the behavior
of Higginson, who has always passed as
a Conservative, and who at last election
pretended to be a friend of the Reform
candidate, Dr. Christie, the respondent
in this case. Higginson called a shabby
trick after the election, having been dis-
appointed in not receiving an official
appointment from the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie.
The determination of the Reform party
here is to re-elect Dr. Christie, who has
consented to stand again.

THE DEMAND FOR IRON - More miles
of railroad will be built in 1880 than in
any year before. About nine thousand
miles of new road are under contract, and
about seventy thousand miles more will
require repairs to the extent of ten
per cent. There is, therefore, the equiv-
alent of eighteen thousand miles of
railroad to be built in 1880 known of.

The railroad demand for metal is esti-
mated at \$2,400,000 tons. S. furnaces
are full of business, and are refusing or-
ders for April and May delivery at pre-
sent prices. The price of foundry iron
in Philadelphia in 1873 was \$23.25 a
ton; last year it was \$18, now it is \$25.55.
