The Engineer testified that the Department is in an efficient state, and that harmony prevails among its members. The apparatus of the Fire Department consists of two steamers, one horse hose cart, two hand hose carts, one hand engine, two Baberick extinguishers, 700 feet of cotton rubber lined hose (new); 1,250 feet of rubber and 520 feet of leather hose, all in serviceable order. One of the most important articles that is necessary to the equipment of a Fire Department, and one that is first needed at fires, the city is deficient of, i.e., a hook and ladder truck, which should be procured at once. The cotton lined hose and the rubber coats have given satisfaction. The Engineer recommended the purchase of nineteen more rubber coats, thereby supplying each fireman with one.
