(Witness.) It will be remembered that during the excited state of popular feeling following the shocking events of the 12th of July 1878, a number of shooting affrays ton place. Among those which culminate in criminal trials were the cases of James Irwin, who was tried and convicted shooting D Carry; David James Spence, who was convicted of shooting Gunning Bell, and Conley for shooting J. Riley. the first case Irwin ared two shors at Carey on St. Mary street, the latter's residence, about midnight. Both the shots took effect, and Irwin, on being convicted, was sentenced by the Hon Mr. Justice Monk to five years in the penitentiary. In the case of Spence the shooting took place during a row near Papineau Square, and the ball being fired into the crowd, bit Genaung Bell is the back. Spence received five years'im prisonment. In the last case, Cooney, with hers, attacked and tired at several men at night, one bullet taking effect on John Riley. Cooney was sentenced to two years. The friends of the accused inter ested themselves on their behalf and presented a petition for their liberation to the Governor-General, which His Exsellency was graciously pleased to grant, upon their turnish g goods to keep the Deace until April 25th, 1883, the date apon' which the conteness of Irwin and Spence would expire. Cooney's sentence
