It is considered certain that the wreckage thrown up at Broughty Ferry and along the shore quite accounts for start for Augusta with their companies all the missing carriages and vans that at once. During the examination of the iron columns of the bridge, which are still hanging in bunches round the tops of each of the piers, it was found that they were filled, some ap parently with cement, but others clearly with nothing but sand. The capital practically lying idle owing to this disaster is represented by the following figures, which reach a total of nearly a million sterling:-Cost of bridge, £480, 000; cost of bridge station, with tunnel communicating with line to the north, £286,000; the Montrose & Arbroath Railway now being constructed as a link in the Tay Bridge system, £150,000; Suburban Railway, between Newport and Tayport, for traffic to Dundee the bridge, £74,000. It appears that the last train which safely crossed the bridge was so affected by the wind that t wheels of the engine grated against the guard-rail, and caused a cuting-us shower of sparks.


