Mr. John McMillan, oil refiner, appealed against the assessment of the school tax. Fanny Campbell: the same should not exceed the sum of \$4,000, being the full value of the property, less the reduction agreed upon. - Referred to the Court of Revision. Year 13; says S. ASSASSIN.

Applications were received from Messrs. C. F. Ireland, F. J. George, John C. Innes, T. Merritt and W. Massey, jr., for the position of Assessor. - Ald. Gaskin moved, seconded by Ald. C. F. Gilderleeve, that C. F. Ireland be Assessor for 1880 at a salary of \$700 per annum, and when not employed on the assessment to assist the Treasurer, or perform any other city work that may be required of him.

Ald. Dupuis moved that the appointment be made by ballot, the applicant getting the greatest number of votes to be elected. Ald. Gaskin urged his motion, the vote to be an open one. Ald. Allen moved, seconded by Ald. Dupuis, that the Council ballot for three Assessors.

The Mayor - That is out of order. You can move for a reconsideration. Ald. Allen - My resolution is tantamount to a reconsideration. I may bow to your decision, but I will differ with you afterwards. Ald. C. F. Gilderleeve - Add the clause for consideration to your resolution.

Ald. Allen said they could add what they pleased, but that he would put the motion in as it was. He argued that it was utterly impossible that any individual could assess the city as it should be according to law within a given time. A man might be found who has the ability and talent necessary to do the work, but he was not the one nominated by Ald. Gaskin. He was not favourable to any one who was named as an applicant; he was opposed to the whole of them. The Council had the power to appoint one Assessor, but if so there would be Assessors appointed by him to assist who would be independent of the Council. The selection of one Assessor would be a great mistake, which they would remember and regret in after years.

The Mayor - According to rules this motion is out of order. Ald. Allen - He expressed the opinion that the motion was out of order, but he wished it put on record. Ald. C. F. Gilderleeve - It's out of order. Ald. Allen - You're 'out of order' where you are now is different from what it was when you were in the Mayor's chair. I bowed to you then but I won't bow to you now. (Laughter.) He wished to say that it would take a majority of the Council to make the appointment legal. He would also like the vote to be taken by ballot, and he would go against the pet whose name was forced upon him.

Ald. Gaskin said the name of Mr. C. F. Ireland was not forced upon any one. That gentleman had not asked for the place, but intended that he would act if appointed. He reminded the city in recent years, had not been satisfactory, and he thought the experiment of having it done by one should be tried. He commented upon the fact that the houses of the city had been assessed at full value, while the larger buildings were not taxed as they should be. The non-resident land would also be better looked after, and by the one Assessor a map could be kept, which the property changes during the year would be noted, and no property overlooked as he alleged, had been done in several wards in Toronto. He would also refer to the fact of the discharge of the old Assessor. If his labors proved unsuccessful the Council could go back to the old system of appointing three assessors.

Ald. Dupuis moved, seconded by Ald. Gaskin's motion was then carried on the following division: Ald. - Aldermen Clements, Duran, Duggan, Gaskin, C. F. Gilderleeve, J. E. Gilderleeve, Harry, Irving, Law, Maloney, McGuire, McIntyre, McKinnon, McKinnon, Pense, Snook, Wilson. - Nays - Aldermen Allen, Angus, Law, Maloney, Pense - 5.

Ald. McMahon - The petition of W. Martin, Dr. Dupuis and Dr. McMahon, as follows: "That your petitioners are a majority of the owners of the real property reported by the Commissioners appointed under the Act passed 20th day of November, 1876, for the purpose of assessing and determining what real property will be immediately benefited by the extension of Montreal Street, in said city, and which report is dated the 4th day of December, 1879, to be immediately acted upon by the Council of Montreal Street, in the said by-law mentioned; that your petitioners represent at least one-half in value of the real property to be benefited by such improvement; that your petitioners submit that the assessment made by the Commissioners was made without their being permitted to be heard on their own behalf, and is unfair to your petitioners, and ought to be rescinded, and your petitioners submit that the said assessment has been made and your petitioners notified thereof, before the opening of said street and the making of said improvements; that your petitioners object and protest against the opening of any portion of the cost of said extension of Montreal Street, on the grounds that said extension was made for the benefit of the city at large; your petitioners therefore pray that the said assessment be not enforced against them, but that the same be set aside as illegal and invalid, and that they be not charged with any of the costs of the said improvements, or of the extension of the said street, or any part thereof. And your petitioners will ever pray."

Ald. McMahon moved that the petition be referred to the Committee on Streets. Ald. Allen suggested that all the street extensions be taken into consideration at the same time. Several wards were concerned in this matter, and there should be no partiality shown. Ald. McIntyre moved, seconded by Ald. Allen, that the Committee on Streets take into consideration all the street extensions in addition to Montreal Street. The mover thought the motion only fair to all concerned. Ald. Pense thought that when any person felt they had been unjustly assessed, they had a perfect right to put in a petition. He did not think any section of the city should be raised, but Ald. McIntyre had not the case in his resolution. He trusted that the gentlemen of the other sections that represented by the petitioners would put in their evidence at once so that a settlement should not be reached by legal means. Ald. Harty remarked that action was somewhat premature, as the Assessment Commissioners had not presented their report to his knowledge. He at least had not seen it. Ald. Allen - Well, you'll be amused when you do see it. (Laughter.) Ald. Pense - The petitioners have seen what the Commissioners have done, having been billed for their share of the expense of the street improvements. Ald. Allen continued the discussion, in the course of which Ald. McMahon defended his action, pointing out that he was one of the petitioners had followed what was laid down as the law. Ald. Harty said the proposition was that the Council was premature. He asked that if the Council entertained the petition it might be stopped as to further action.
