MR. HOOPER'S DEFICIENCY.

The Napanee Express gives a lengthy extract from the report of the Commissioners who made an examination of the books of the Tressurer of Lennox and Addington and unveiled a deficiency which has been the talk of the county ever since. The Commission condemns the system of book-keeping followed by Mr. Hooper, an audit of which was rendered the more difficult and unsatisfactory in consequence of the absence of documentary evidence, and of the lack of of information which Mr. Hooper declined to give. In the account between Frontenac and Lennox & Ad dington the discrepancy is as it was represented to be sometime ago-that is on the 18th of February, 1866. Mr Hooper professes to have paid to the Treasurer of Frontenac \$968 while Frontenac only gives credit for a payment of \$698 The total liability of the Treasurer is placed at \$50,458.28, which taclades compound interest on some stems for several years. In deference to the request of Mr. Hooper the Counties Council of Lennox & Addington has allowed Mr. Hooper until March to prepare a statement of his case.

----THE ACRICULTURAL COLLEGES. We are glad to observe that the Gov ernment measure, designed to amend the constitution and to improve the condition of our Agricultural College, has passed its second reading, and will shortly become law. There is no more useful nor necessary institution in the country than this one. It's very existence is a practi cal recognition of the dignity and importance of agricultural pursuits, and an expression of the Government determination that those pursuits shall share the advantage and assistance which see ence now randers to every sphere of human activity. Almost the only conper at the Bill, Abraham Lauder, of South Grey, expressed his fears that the College would infuse too much of this scientific information into modern Canadian farming. At present he said the teach ing in the college was too theoretical This can scarcely be when the students have to spend as much of their time afield or among the stock as they do at their books or in the class-room. the value of Abraham's opinion in this matter may be pathered from the fact that he opened his little criticism with an ex pression of regret at hearing of any changes whatever in the institution, and yet wound up by saying he "hoped some change for the better would be made as the Province had now a large stake the College!" So much, by the way, for Mr. Lauder's charming consistency. The Hon. S. C. Wood, in moving the second reading of the Bill, correctly remarked that the College had outlived adverse prejudices, and was now an assured and established success. As an experiment the institution was at first styled the "Ontario School of Agriculture and Ex perimental Farm." It consisted, besides the buildings, of 550 acres of land, composed of almost every variety of soil, and for this reason was well suited to the in tended purpose. Its two-fold object was (1) to give to the foung agriculturists the Province a thorough mastery of the theory and practice of husbandry and (2) to conduct agricultural experiments, and publish the results of the same for the public information. The course of in struction embraced farm, live-stock, horticultural and mechanical departments, terms that, we should say, imply no lack of the practical. Of course the student is put through a curriculum of study, but all the subjects included therein, such as Botany, Chemistry, Geology, Practical Agriculture, etc., etc., have a direct bearing upon the primary object of the Government to promote intelligent farming and to elevate what is too often considered, even by those who are engaged in it, as a menial occupation into what should be regarded as county the highest practical illustration of the "dignity of labour." Besides all this, the admirable discipline which prevails in the institution, and the systematics regularity with which all its operations are conducted, cannot fail to be of inestimable value to its graduates in their subsequent career in life.
