He said it had been analyzed, and that it was declared to be purer than the standard drinking water prescribed by the sanitary authorities of England. Were the pneumatic system adopted in this city the expense attending its application would not be so great as if a kind of drainage did not now exist, inasmuch as the latter would admirably suit for carrying off storm waters. The introduction of the pneumatic system, under such circumstances, would not coat one-half of what it otherwise would. He spoke of what would be required in the event of the change. Yearly much money was wasted upon what are known as the water systems. He had suggested the trial of the pneumatic principles in Moutreal, but there was no disposition to do so there, nor did he suppose there

was a disposition to try it in Kingston. He urged his hearers to breathe air as pure as possible, to est pure food and drink pure water, and the latter he would prefer taken from the lake than from wells the supplies of which in most cases are governed by surface drainage. Water could be made pure either by filtering or by boiling. He closed by referring to the need in Canada of a Sanitary Bureau, to which a yearly sum of \$15,000 or \$20,000 should be voted in the interest of health and healthful living.
