IRON MINING.—Mr. Boyd Caldwell, of Perth, has commenced operations at his iron mine in the Township of Levan, and he has already taken out over 200 tons of ore. The deposit is very extensive, 30 feet in width, and is as far as at present known about 300 yards in length, the openings having been made nearly six miles from the present terminus of the Kingston & Pembroke Railway, but when this road is extended it will pass within a mile of it. Mr. Caldwell intends sending a sample to Pittsburgh, Pa., in the Spring to be assayed.

CONFISCATED DISCIPLES IN PROCELS.—Wong Chin Foo, the disciple of Confucius, and alleged to have defrauded a number of Chinamen out of \$2 each on the false representation that the money was for a city license to maintain a laundry, was before Justice Ingersoll, of Chicago, on Thursday for trial. The little room of the magistrate was filled to overflowing with the almond-eyed celestials. The claim of the prisoner was that he was collecting money to publish a Chinese directory of the city of Chicago, and, after an extended hearing, lasting all day, he was discharged.
