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CITY COUNCIL.

A SPECIAL MEETING—MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS—BORDER-TOWN CONDUCT—AN AWKWARD FEUD.

A special meeting of the City Council was held last evening. There were present Mayor Carson, Ald. Allen, Gaskin, Foster, Giddens, Dupper, C. F. Giddens, Lawrance, Maloney, McGuire, and McInyre, McMahon, Penne, and Snook.

When the meeting had been called to order, Ald. Penne rose to a question of privilege. Last night he had contradicted a remark made by the Chairman of the Council.

Ald. Gaskin—This is a special meeting for special purposes!

Ald. Hartly—An adjourned meeting of the Council is a meeting of privilege always takes precedence.

Ald. Gaskin explained that he had been speaking in reply to Ald. Hartly's financial review when he declared that several of the Council members had appropriated his statement.

Ald. Snook—Not overdrawn but over-expended.

Ald. Gaskin said that meant that there was more money spent than the Council appropriate of its account than was in condition at the present.

THE MARKET TOLLS.

Mr. Metcalfe submitted a letter from Mr. Metcalfe, M.P.P., to the effect that there was no objection to send a deputation from the Council to Toronto at this juncture, as Mr. Hartor's Bill, proposing to abolish the market tolls, was not likely to pass.

MUNICIPAL ACT AMENDMENTS.

Ald. C. F. Giddens submitted the report of the Committee on Municipal Affairs, and proposed that the Council be authorized to draft amendments to the Municipal Act to cover the following amendments and proposals.

1. To compile all joint stock companies, banks, building societies, and railway companies, doing business in the city, to make returns of assets and liabilities, monthly.

2. To abolish the reduction of assessment on account of vacancy to less than six months.

3. Power to license fish shops, not to exceed \$20.

4. Power to amend sub-section 2, section 465, so that an auctioneer selling lands be liable to pay a license fee.

5. To prevent the Council from acting as counsel, attorney or agent in any claim, suit or proceeding against the Corporation, and from voting on any matter or claim against the Corporation in which he is interested as claimant, principal or as trustee, agent, or counsel, or attorney, or shall any member of the Council furnish any supplies, or do any work, or service, to or for the Corporation, directly or indirectly, as trustee, agent, or counsel.

It was thought that the bank managers could be made to give the notice of the stock holders.

Ald. C. F. Giddens replied in the affirmative, assuming that the suggestion became the law of the land.

The clause passed.

Ald. C. F. Giddens explained that at present the law left it optional for the Council of Revision to make remissions of tax when houses were more than three months vacant.

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Ald. Snook moved that exemptions from assessment be abolished to the full extent as now considered by the Government.

Ald. McMahon—We want to go further.

Ald. C. F. Giddens—I have a great deal of confidence in the present Government, but I do not think it is wise to extend as much.

(Another confusion took place, and the balance of tongues was something awful to contemplate. The Chairman's remarks were misunderstood at least understood.)

Ald. J. P. Giddens suggested that the Bill now before the Legislature be considered at a special meeting to be called by the Mayor.

Ald. McIntyre was in favour of full exemption for poor people, sometimes enabling them to procure money advances, they were a strong stimulus to error.
