SIR,-In the report, extracts of which were published in your paper lately, it is stated that the men of "A" Battery formed too many ties, in Kingston, and that these detract from their usefulness, inasmuch as they tend to make the Battery a local affair and not a Dominion force. Allowing this to be true, it does not follow that the men are discontented on that account, but rather the reverse. The officers would like to get them to Quebec, as they think they could use them then, just as they saw fit, and no one would take their part, as has been done in the columns of your valuable paper. In other words there would be no WHIG in Quebec. Again it is stated that men desert because they are under the impression that they can get good wages. The fact is they can get better wages here. The great trouble is that the Commandant of the School of Gunnery either does not know one halt of what transpires in the Battery, or, knowing it, is too apt to leave the duties of Commanding Officer to those who should fill a subordinate position. No wonder the men are discontented when the unfeeling manner in which they are spoken to continually by certain officers of the school, and without a chance of redress is remembered. Again there is never any consideration shewn on the part of the officers as to the comfort of the men, much less their amusement or improvement. All the officers want is to get their own end served, and if they can get the regulation drill out of the men they can go to --- for the rest of the time for all the officers care. This is daily life in "A" Battery. There is no encouragement for any man to do his duty from principle. He is not set the example.
