When conscious of right this paper, under the present regime, has backed down to no one, and its record is above comparison with the journal which, at this moment, is notoriously in bad grace with many on account of its misstatements. The repetition of what the Mail may say erronsously-and it is not above suspicion-is offensive enough, but the circumstance becomes the more objectionable when we are lectured for that of which our friends are themselves most guilty.

In the matter of insolvency repeal what will the Senate do this session in the event of the Government adopting as its o n Mr. Colby's Bill ? In the days of the late Government it mattered little to the Tory Senate about the Government's adoption of any measure to which a majority in the former was opposed. In fact the Senate was in conflict with the Government all through, and made it its special business to clog and obstruct the wheels of administration to the utmost of its power, not at all for the public good, but in the interest of party. The Senate then had no compunction whatever about easting out legislation-whether Governmental or private-which was at all ob noxious to its Tory instincts. With their co-partizane in power, however, the scene is changed. Last session they threw out the Bill for the repeal of the Insolvency laws, but then it was not a Government measure. In fact it had been introduced in the Commons by a Liberal, an incident which we dure say was not forgotten when they unceremoniously rejected the Bill. Now, however, that the Government which the Senate majority dare not oppose, is said to be fathering the Bill which was introduced this session by a Conservative member, Mr. Colby, we expect to see the Tory dotards of the Canadia.s 'Lords' accepting the situation and passing Repeal. If they don't the country will be very much surprised at their unwonted assertion of independence

## OUR COVERNMENTAL FIGURE-HEADS.

The office of Governor-General of Can ada has cost our people over a million and a half of dollars during the past twelve years, being an average of slightly over \$125,000 for every year since Confederation. Of course the Governor General for the time being does not absorb the whole of this vast sum. The honorarium attached to the office Canadian Vice Roy is only \$50,000 per annum. This is a sum quite too large for Canada to pay for the Executive figure head as such, but it was the amount-£10,000-insisted upon by the British Government in 1867, and when our Parliament subsequently protested that it was too large we were reminded that was to be regarded, not as the mere salary of Her Majesty's representative, but as the price of British connection and Britieh protection.
