You remember the sortie made upon the entrenchments, when Osman at the head of his starving soldiers attempted to cut and was compelled to yield, the whole army surrendering themselves as prison-Rev. T. G. Smith, Convener of the ers. They came in detachments of about ments of Russians, and were billeted on the peasantry. Typhoid fever, small-pox and dysentery had decunated their ranks and they were so weak they could scarcely hobble along. The inhabitants of the village, inhuman wretches, turn ed these poor prisoners out into the snow, and too debilitated to resist they lay down and were frozen to death Every morning carts went round picking up the dead. The spirit of cama. aderic is very strong among the Turks. saw one poor wretch-dying from fatigue and fever, assisted by a stronger comrade, halting by the roadside until the rear guard of the Roumanians came up. These soldiers separated the men, using the butt of their rifles. The dying man was deserted and doubtless became the prey of the dogs and the vultures. The whole country from Petuni to Simnitza was covered with corpses. Vultures and carrion crows were hovering over them, contesting for the spoil with the dogs-a horrid species,

CABLE EXPORT .- The report of the Minister of Agriculture gives some interesting facts as to shipment of Canadian cattle to the old country during 1879. The totals were : Horned cattle, 24,680; sheep, 79,085; swine, 4,745 horses and mules, 560. The losses ofjanimals on board the Allan and Dominion steamers were smaller than by other lines. The ratics of loss were 8 per 1,000 mules, and 24 per 1,000 on sheep.
