GLADSTONE'S OPINION OF AUSTRIA. Following are Mr. Gladstone's remarks on Austria, in his Edinburgh speech, of which a brief summary was transmitted by cable.

THE ANNUAL MEETING—A GOOD EXHIBIT. Last evening the annual meeting of the St. George's Society of Kingston was held at St. George's Hall.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS. Brethren,—It is with great pleasure that I meet you here again this evening at our annual meeting.

THE SOCIETY'S FINANCES. The receipts for the year were reported at: Cash balance, \$4.97; anniversary service, \$28.33; subscriptions of members, \$160.00; dinner, \$84; picnic, \$44.70; loans returned, \$55.00; interest, \$24.00; Christmas distribution, \$79.50; regalia, \$20.50; special testimonial fund, \$108.32; excursion balance, \$3; total, \$682.24.

THE SOCIETY'S FINANCES (cont.). The disbursements were \$221.27, leaving a cash balance in hand of \$60.94, against liabilities of \$47.45. There is a mortgage of \$200 and a post office investment of \$140 in the permanent fund.
