The following is a summary of Mr. Wallace's Bill for the distribution of defaulting debtore: The issue of a writ of execution for an amount over \$100 constitutes the debtor an insolvent, and the property seized is held for all the creditors. The sheriff, within five days of its issue, is to notify the debtor, and within ten days of notice the latter is to fyle with the sheriff a list of all his liabi lities, with the names and residences of the creditors. The sheriff then, within tive days, notifies the creditors that unless forbidden by any of them within one one month, he will sell the property at public auction. The sheriff may call meeting of the creditors at the request of any or more of them, to determine the disposition of the property. One month's notice of this meeting is required, and it must be held within three months of the date of notice calling it. No sale can be made excepting on a vote representing two-thirds of value of all the claims. Oath a to be made that the claim voted correctly stated and is uninsured. Judicial sale will be a full discharge from the debt for which the property is sold Where the owner's valuation shows assets' covering liabilities, creditors are to give conds to pay to the owner any sum remaining after paying 75 per cent of all claims. On the contrary, if, after such a valuation by the debtor, 75 per cent. all claims shown in his statement, and ncluding law costs, is not realized in three years, he is not only not relieved of liability but may be found guilty of a misdemeanor. A debtor whose set time

for payment has been extended, may make quarterly payments of not less than 10 per cent, until his liabilities are fully liquidated, the first due three months after the expiration of the extension Penal provisions are made for evasions and fraud on the part of both debtor and creditor. Mortgages given more than five days after the contracting of debt will be invalid as a ainst other creditors. Sheriff's fees are fixed at \$5 for estates under \$1,000, \$10 for these above that value. Costs of management are to be a row at his painful death.
