Small Pox or Apoplexy?

To the Editor of the British Whia DEAR SIR, - I see by your issue of last evening that Dr. Phelan gives his opinion of the cause of the death of one Richard Hutcheson in public print. When there are no other channels for medical men to place their views, however, suppose I must follow suit. Please allow me give my version of what I saw. I was summoned by Mrs. Hutcheson to visit her son on Sunday afternoon about four o'clock. I went immediately, not knowing that Dr. Phelan had been

there before, and found my patient lying on the floor working in convulsions, he having risen from a bed (an ordinary bedateau nut a small bed on the floor) apparently to vomit in a pail that was placed along side. This exertion, no doubt, was the cause of the convulson, as the man, from appearances, had been suffering from phlegmonous er ysipelas. To my mind there was not a sign or symptom of aniall pox. No doubt he had contracted this disease, for he said he had been working among rags. After my patient me a helping hand to place the poor unfortunate back on his ted, but they seemed to be perfectly panic stricken. then went to the station house and informed Sergeant Nugent of the circumstances of the case. He applied to the Mayor, who had the deceased interred. Mr. White (Cardwell) contended that both Messre. Mackenzie and Blake were delivered 3,15 to 3,20. committed to the early construction of the British Columbia section of the Pacific Railroad, as provided by the Carnarvon terms, and to the annual expenditure in that Province of two miltions of dollars on account of the road. A considerable portion of his speech was devoted by Mr. White to maintaining the superiority of the North-West Territory as a field for immigration, and to showing that both the leaders of the Opposition had depreciated the Territory.

Mr. Anglin showed, by quoting the financial record of the Dominion since Confederation, that the country was not in a position to increase its expenditure without forcing the whole of the Provinces into irretrievable ruin.

Mr. Macdougall appeared to indicate a preference for the construction of the Pacific Railway as an undertaking by private capitalists and not the Government He claimed that Mr. Blake, instead of moving that the construction of the Yale-Kamloops branch should be postponed should have moved that the construction of the road be abandoned west of Winnipeg. Considering the circumstances he would vote in favour of the Government's policy.

Speeches against the amendment were delivered by Messrs, McLennan, Dawson, and Gircuard (Jacques Cartier), who claimed that it was tantamount to repudiating the terms of union with British Columbia, besides retarding the development of the country.
