CANAL TOLLS.

RGING THE REDUCTION OF CANAL TOLLS-

THE POLICY OF THE GOVERNMENT. On Friday a deputation from St. Catharines consisting of Dr. Oille, Capt. Tay lor, Capt. Neelon, M. P. P., and John Riordon waited upon Sir Charles Tupper at Ottawa respecting the Welland Canal and the charges levied on shipping at the

of Parliament were present. Dr. Oille, after pressing home the points he urged at a previous interview, dealt with the Welland Canal enlargement, which should be completed at once, and the present aqueduct used until the new one is ready. Upon the great prin ciple that the larger the vessel the sheaper the coat of transport. Grain can be car ried from Chicago to Kingston in a vessel of 60,000 bushels capacity at an actual coat for transport of three cents per bushel less than in a vessel of 19,000 bushels capacity, the present canal size. As between vessels of the above relative size, the transport of twenty million bushels of grain in vessels of the large class means a saving of \$600,000 a year in expense to the vessel owners, and the chance of making profits from the carrying trade where now is actual loss. Then as to the ship building, which used to be an industry of the first class importance. no vessels are on the stocks in the ship yards of Ontario. Small vessels do not pay, and as soon as the enlargement is completed they will become more or less obsolete. On the other hand, large vessels will not be commerced autil the enlargement of the canal is completed. So the prospect of work for our shipyards is bad for several years to come, onless the suggestion above made is acted upon. Tenders for the bridges and lock gates for the enlarged canal have been asked for. After mature reconsideration of the entire question of placing traffic at Montreal on as cheap a basis as that at New York, since pilotage and towage to Montreal, from physical reasons, must always remain a more extensive work than at New York, there appears to be only one plan having a probability of being effec tual in making Montreal a free port for ships, and affording free wharfage for goods also, or at most subjecting them to

You have the fact that pavigation at Montreal is open only one-half a year, and it is almost impossible for a port, closed six months out of ten, to compete with a port open all the year round. Traffic gets to run in a groove, and it is one of the difficulties ,we have to meet. It is an additional reason, you will say, and I admit it, why the Government should do everything in its power to overcome the difficulty, but it is a great difficulty You have not only a great country furnishing a market for enormous imports and bringing shipping to the port of New York, but that port is open all the year round. You have also the greater difficulty of the interest cost/of towage. I presume no gentleman present will go the length of saying that the Government must spend, not only au enormous amount on the enlargement of the Welland Canal-for that is disposed of, and being done as promptly as possible--but go on and enlarge the St. Lawrence canals at a great cost, and having done that you must tow vessels from Quebec to Montreal. Hardly any one would say it was the duty of the Government to expend public money to that extent. Therefore, it has been deemed a wise policy to improve these channels of communication by expenditure, not only of the public money, but by an expenditure that was necessary as a means of obtaining the shipping frequenting Montreal. If we have not taken a proper percentage of the volume of foreign trade, we may congratulate ourselves upon the fact that, instead of the traffic through our own line of communication having decreased, it largely increased during last with the previous year.

There is a funny little anecdote affoat port of Montreal. Besides the gentlemen n the newspaper about a sailor who was forming the deputation several members terribly puzzied what to do with a rope that was too long for his purpose. He said if it was too short he could splice it. but how to dispose of the extra quantity was more than he was equal to. This illustrates the position of Congress on the Geneva Award. The conference exacted so much money from Great Britain for the depredations of the rebel cruiser Alabama, that all the just claims are paid, and there is a surplus left over which Congress don't seem to know what to do with. Common honesty would seem to dictate that the surplus ought to be paid back to England, but that teature of the case does not appear to be considered at all. How to absorb the surplus is the only question discussed. and on that subject there is a great di versity of opinion among Senators. Some advocate the proposition to give to the insurance companies that insured the plandered vessels and were obliged to pay the owners, the value of the cargo and vessels lost and destroyed, and some even go so far as to advocate the dis tribution of the surplus money among the owners of the vessels and cargoes to indemnify them for the prospective prohts they would have made provided their vessels had made the voyage safely. But these claims have been, in our opinion, very properly ignored, and now the question remaining is one of common honesty and fairness. England has no legal claim upon us for the surplus money She was a party to the Geneva conference and agreed to the amount of the award and paid it without hesitation but she has a moral claim to the surplus, and it should be paid to her as promptly as she paid the amount to us. The money was brained from England in satisfaction of a specific claim for specific damages; and the claim was not made by the government in its own behalf, but by the government in behalf of its injured subjects.
