A Great Waste. It is the practice of many dairy farmers to kill the calves at a very early age, long before they can be -or should be, of any use as food. This is a source of loss, which, take the country through, is some thing enormous. An animal already grown to the weight of 60 to 80 pounds and which might, through a few weeks of proper feeding, be made to yield a large amount of food, is killed, and all that is saved is the skin ! There are cases when it is the best economy to get rid of the calves so soon as they come, but these are exceptional, and in the ordinary dairy of a farm practising mixed husbandry, there is seldom, if ever, a call for such an untimely and unprofitable removal of the calves. It will pay well in many cases to grow the calves until they are six months old, and thus produce an animal weighing 500 pounds, and of the best quality, commanding a ready sale in the markets .- American Agriculturist.
