CLASS OF HEMP. -There has been a hemp case pending in the Custom House here for weeks. A local manufacturer of twine and rope has for years imported the raw material duty free. His latest importation was in April stopped for a duty of 20 per cent. He cannot afford to pay it, as he has to manufacture at auch close figures that the duty will more than absorb the profit. MEETING PAPERS AND DISCUSSIONS - USEFUL

The semi-annual meeting of the Teach ers' Association opened this morning the lecture room of the Collegiate School building at 9:30 o'clock. The President, Mr. A. P. Knight, M.A., occupied the

The Secretary, Miss M. Livingston,

read the minutes of the last meeting of the Association, which were confirmed. Mr. J.S. Wood then read his papers on the manner of teaching grammar to beginners. He opened by stating that the paper was not so much for stating the opinions of one party as to produce discussion and criticism. He disapproved of at first teaching grammar by giving long and abstrace definitions. The subject should be taught in a natural manner, having the eye as an aid to the ear He would begin with the article, the noun, then the adjective as less likely to prevent confusion, and get the pil to write the names of all things be -Years ago Wolfe Island was considcould think of, and afterward to have adjectives prefixed. The verb he have affixed to the noun. After these were finished he did not anticipate much difficulty in teaching the other parts of speech, except the conjunctions and pre. positions. The discussion was opened by Mr. Kidd, who fully endorsed the opinions entertained by Mr. Wood. He thought it was a mistaken notion that any person could teach grammar. The truth was the best teachers should be in charge of the junior classes.

Mr. Summerby enlarged on the benefit Teachers' Associations and the good they were designed to effect. He sug- Property gested that at the next meeting of Association scholars be introduced, and the actual teaching illustrated:

Mr. Knight's opinion was that five or six years were utterly wasted in teaching grammar. Some of the compositions he read as an examiner would not only afford amusement, but would be a piteous exhibition of the instructions of persons in this subject.

Mr. Metcalfe, M.P.P., thought the subject by the teacher should be ac cording to his own well considered plan. Mr. T H. McGurl followed with a paper on "Natural History," which occupied about an hour in delivery. The essay certainly indicated a good deal of reading and labor in the way of preparation. It was a little too deep for a meet ing of the Association, called for the consideration of practical subjects, as Mr. Summerby remarked in his comment

At noon the meeting adjourned, the announcement being made that the evening meeting would not be addressed by Mr. S. Wo-de, but by Rev. A. Wilson, a former superintendent of schools, and a well known educationalist.
