UNFAIR EXEMPTIONS.

The gentlemen who are taking advantage, undue advantage as many think, of the Exemption Act in repudiating their liability to local taxation, are extremely law-abiding. So loyal are to the law in the case that they would not think of vio lating it by the payment of civic taxation of which they receive their full share of value. The very gentlemen who now demand a refund of taxes already paid and who refuse to pay any more, had once to bear their little share of the civio burden out of, perhaps, small er incomes than they are now enjoy ing as the public expense. To whichever political party they then belonged they were not more eligible for the places they now fill than acores of equally deserving men in either party. With the assist ance and influence of many of these the places were procured for the present occupants, and now the citizens who helped these gentlemen to office are virtually asked to pay their taxes for them. This may be law, but it is not justice, and the sooner such fisgrant, unjust exemptions are abolished the better. We admit it is human nature to take advantage even of an unjust arrangement like this that will portion to population in England. compel a man's neighbour to pay taxes for him. Examples of high principle like that set by the late Professor Mackerras, who, by paying his taxes when he need not have done so, refused to be in any seuse a beneficiary upon the rest of the community, are few and far between. There is no hope for it but to agitate for the repeal of these abominable exemptions, which are as unaccountable and absurd as they certainly are partical and unfair.

THE NEW SENATOR-

With almost indecent haste the Govern ment has filled the seat vacated by the death of the Hon. George Brown in the Dominion Senate. So prompt has the Government been in this instance that the announcement appeared in the Mail just one week from the date of Senator Brown's funeral. Parliament has just been prorogued, and therefore the new Senator cannot take his place in the House for the best part of a year.
