It has not taken the British Government long to revise the Imperial policy in Afghanistan and South Africa. It is evident that, just so soon as the national honor will permit, the troops will be withdrawn from the former, the policy of aggression having already been arrested by order of the Home authorities. As to South Africa similar orders have been issued and Mr. Bartle Frere's occupation has been declared as good as gone. The policy of the unpopular Governor of Cape Colony has been expressly condemned by the British people in the elections, and, without abruptly dismissing him, the instructions which have been sent to him are virtually an expression of nonconfidence and a broad hint to resign. It remains to be seen whether the Governor will take this hint or wait for a less delicate invitation to step down and out of a position which he has not filled with credit to himself or to the advantage of the nation he represents.

We cannot but think the County Coun cil, on sober second thought, will regret the heaty action of refusing a grant to that deserving and serviceable public charity, the House of Industry. The fact that the number of its inmates is partly recruited from the county, and that these are in many cases unpaid for by the townships from which they hail, constitute an unanswerable argument why the County Council should recognize a just claim upon it by paying something towards the maintenance of this institution. By declining to accede to the reasonable request of the deputation, the city is compelled either to support the county poor or to rigorously refuse the latter admission to the House of Industry. Such a course, we are sure, would be adopted with great reluctance by the Directors, and only under the pressure of an absolute lack of funds such as has been threatened by the reduction of the Government grant and the refusal of the County Council. We trust the latter will yet see the reasonableness and necessity of doing its share in contributing to the support of an ineti. tution among whose inmates the county has been continuously represented. The County Council owes it to its own sense of self-respect to contribute its share towards an expense for which it is nominally, if not legally, responsible equally with the city supporters of this public

charity. ACOLITION IN QUEBEC. Notice to quit has been virtually served on the Legislative Council of Quebec. Mr. Mercier's motion for its abolition did net carry, it is true, but it was defeated by only a small majority, and the agitation will be continued in House and press and country until such an obviously useless and expensive nullity shall be effaced from existence as a branch of the Provincial Legislature. It will be remembered that when Hop.
