CATHEDRAL - SERMON OF REV. MR. BOGERT-BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

To day the eighteenth session of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario opened in St. George's Hall. As usual divine service was held previous, evensong being held in the Cathedral last evening at half-past seven o'clock. The Bishop was attended by Canon Jones, his chaplain, who carried the pastoral staff. Canor Jones, who is also Diocesan Precentor, intoned the prayers. The psalms were chapted. The Archdeacon of Ottawa Dr. Lauder, read the first lesson, and the Dean of Ontario the second. The sermon was preached by Rev. J. J
