THE JESUIT ORDER.

Expulsion of Franciscans-Protesting against Barbarity

Paris, July 2 - At Beizers, in Department of Herault, there is consid erable agitation against the monastic orders. Yesterday a deputation of Republicians waited on the sub-Prefect to demand the expulsion of the Franciscan brothers. In the evening a mob of a thousand persons surrounded the Franciscan monastery, some even entering the house, but the military ultimately dispersed the crowd.

In the Chamber of Deputies to day there was a heated discussion on the ex pulsion of the Jesuits. . M. Treppe saked the Government why violence had been used in the execution of the decrees, and why they were executed without legal warrants. He asked if the Minister of War had authorized the army to assist, and protested against the acts of barbarity as unworthy of the nation. M. Constans, Minister of the Interior and Worship, said the decre s had been executed in accordance with his orders, and on his responsibility. He stated that M. Freppel had left the Chamber to go to Angeren When the Commisary went to the Jesuit house the first person he encountered was M. Fre; pel who, himself, provoked the violence of which he now complained. No one could be allowed to transgress the laws. Monseigneur Freppel rejoined that if by the decree 'you can force bolts and violate domiciles you will do it on all occasions. With this mode of proceeding no security exists. Every election will henceforth be fought on the issue of public liberty Paris, July, 3 - The Prefect of the Department of the Nord, having taken further steps in case of the suit instigated by the expelled Jesuits at the Lile tribunal, has declined to proceed with the hearing of it. This leaves the question of jurisdiction to go through the ordinary tedions stage, and refrains from ordering, as it might do, the temporary reinstate ment of the Jesuits.
