### THE MANAGER'S CAREER.

Mr. Forepaugh started in life a butche boy, working at four dollars a month by the year. He is 49 years of age at the present time. After serving to the butchering business he engaged in horse dealing, and during the war handled ten thousand horses in a single year. He dropped into the circus business in this manner. Having sold a bill of horses to a circus company and not getting pay for them he took hold of the concern and managed it under its old auspices, bringing himself out all right For several seasons he ran a circus in Dan Rice's name, but came out under his own name some sixteen years ago. At this time the show property was worth \$40,000; now his circus and mena gerie is estimpted at a million dollars. Notwithstanding that Mr. Forepaugh has expended a great deal of money by his show property he has accumulated wealth, being the owner of one hundred houses in Philadelphia. He also owns considerable property in Brooklyn, N.Y. The profits of his business have reached \$125,000 for a season. The management of his great aggregation takes in 250 mer and women.
