THE TWELFTH.

This is one of the historic days which a portion of our citizens deem it a duty to commemorate.

It is a sad and a gloomy day, and the development of a spirit of genuine liberation, if all these could be done without stirring in any breast the feelings of resentment.

In a mixed community like ours it is wise, of course, for men to give an unimpaired provocation to their fellow-citizens, but it is at the same time a nobler thing for the non-participants in the 17th of March or 12th of July, or any such day, to regard the display in a philosophical and tolerating spirit, and without imputing any intention to give offence, to be determined to take none.

As a purely historical matter the event which to-day is celebrated, and which resulted in a great dynamic change for England and the Empire, can now be calmly contemplated by all, irrespective of party or religious or sectarian bias.

Viewed in this light the event is important enough to deserve commemoration without the excitement of the least sectarian bitterness.

So long as these public celebrations continue let them be observed both by participants and on-lookers in this way and they will be largely if not entirely divested of that feeling of faction which has been quite unnecessarily associated with them in times gone by.

County Improvements. To the Editor of the British Whig. Sir,—Would you kindly grant me space in your columns to say a few words to your readers relative to our position here.

Infant mortality has been alarmingly increased in the large cities by the heated term. In New York alone in twenty-four hours no less than sixty-five children died from sunstroke.
