tance. He seemed quite strong. The Tribune says, the regular physicians who have watched Dr. Tanner closely, believe that he is speedily growing weaker. This opinion was strengthened by the examinations last night. It is said he may lose his senses any time, and that this condition will be followed by sudden death. The doctor does not share this opinion.

New York, July 12 -At goon Dr Tanner appeared to be in remarkably good spirits. His eyes and face looked quite as healthy as on any day during the first week of the fast. He is still confident that he can accomplish the undertaking, and laughs at the statement that he has partaken of nourishment since the commencement of the fast. He has lost 244 pounds in weight.
