For this abstention they are deserving of great credit, for that self-denial is worthy of recognition which torgoes the exercise of an undoubted right rather than disturb the peace of the community and precipitate trouble, tumult, and possible bloodshed. In this connection, also, we are perfectly free to say that the opposing societies down there, which assume it as their special mission to prevent an Orange parade, might very salely and properly have omitted to publicly summon their forces together for yester day morning. No other possible interpretation would be put upon this action but that it was intended, if not as a menace, at least as a precaution and preventive measure, and this of itself might be regarded as a breach of the forced truce which meantime happily prevails in Montreal.
