SAD DROWNING CASE. A PLEASURE TRIP MARRED BY AN ACCIDENT

-AN UNFORTUNATE MISSTEP IN THE

Yesterday morning, per steamer 'Alexandra, a party of about thirty ladies and gentlemen left Belleville upon a two weeks' tour to Montreal, Sorel, Lakes Champlain and George, Quebec, and the return Wellesley Island on which the Thousand Island Park is situated. Having some difficulty in the shipment of her luggage one of the party, Miss Mary Potter, a teacher in the Belleville High School, was left behind. She took the afternoon train, bound eastward. reaching this city about 2 p.m., and awaiting the arrival of the steamer. stopped at the Anglo-American Hotel. The steamer arrived here shortly after 9 o'clock, and Miss Potter started for the boat, accompanied by the hotel porter who carried her trunk. The 'Alexandra' lay at Gunn's wharf, upon which there was no light. After turning southward near the end of the dock a cabman was met, and the two pedestrians turned out of the way, the former to the right and Miss Porter to the left. The latter passed around the end of a woodpile, and in the darkness stepped off the wharf into the water. The porter had walked to the boat before he missed Miss Potter, and then the truth dawned upon him. She had given no cry alarm. When search was made her umbrella and hat were found floating on the water, and these being evidences of the drowning accident Mr. J.
