Shocking Murder in England.

The quiet amourh of Belvedere, near Woodwich, has been shocked by a deli berate murder. On the edge of Abbey Wood are some tea partiens attached to the Leather Bottle tavern, and from this place loud screams were heard. A laborer named John Smith, in the employ of the Frith Local Board of Health, ran from his work on the adjacent road, and was horrified at seeing a man sta bing a woman in the neck, as she was in the act of falling; repeated blows upon her on her breast tollowed as she lay upon the ground. Seeing Smith approach, the man desisted and walked away, but his victim was found to have been mortally wounded, and lived but a few minutes. The murderer was recognized as a carpenter, named Thomas Berry, hying in the neighborhood, and his victim was a young woman with whom he has been for some time acquainted. He was immediately arrested, and the instrument of murder, a keenly-whet ed chisel, was taken from him. He stated he had carried the weapon about him for the purpose since the previous night, and after the body was laid upon a board and covered with a sack, he lifted the covering, and, addressing the corpse, said,
