

The other was burned down long ago and an Orange Hall erected upon its foundation, and yet, singular to say, the insurance upon the building (\$60) was not asked for and paid; on the contrary the Royal Com pany has been carrying the insurance. and this year issued a new policy for a further three years upon a property of which but a little ashes and a few pine cinders are now visable.
