The proposed dissolution of the Irish Relief Committee is a reassuring sign of departing distress. Beneficent as have been the operations of this committee no one will regret that its occupation is gone. The prospect of an immediate and abundant harvest is said to be assured and the condition of the people is already improving from this cause. Had this year's harvest proven a failure no doubt the people of England, America, including Canada, and other countries would have responded again to the intensified appeals for succour. It is a question, however, if as much could be raised again as was realized last year. But this is neither here nor there. The one great point to be glad about is that the sad occasion for outside help has passed away and that an abundant harvest will largely if not en tirely supply the people's wants and to banish the gaunt spectre of famine from the Emerald Isle.

Important Increase in Several Articles.

Washington, July 30. -1,117,000 tons of iron and steel were exported to this country from Great Britain during the six months ending June 30th, against 13,000 tons for the same period last year. The exports of cotton goods were increased from 26,000,000 yards to 47,000,000 The exports of wool were thirteen times as large as in 1879, and woolen cloths twice as large. The exports of worsted stuffs incressed from 12,000,000 to 20;-000,000 yards, and the exports of carpets were thirteen times as great as in the first half of 1879. The exports of yarn were increased from 562,000 lbs. to 3,734,000 lbs; the jute manufactures from 24,000,000 yards to 47,000,000 yards; the linen piece goods from 44,-000,000 yards to 56,000,000. There was an increase of 50 per cent, in the value of engines brought over and 200 per cent. in all other machinery.
