THE LATE MR. ADAIR.—Another much respected citizen has been removed by death—Mr. Alexander Adair, for many years a resident of the city.

THE FIREWORKS DISPLAY.—To-morrow evening the display of fireworks will take place at the Thousand Island Park.

JUDGE HAGEMAN'S PICTURE.—The portrait of the late Judge Hageman, which has been lent by the Kingston City Council to his daughter, Mrs. Beverly Robinson, wife of the Lieut.-Governor, and which will be hung in the dining room at the Government House, is by the famous artist Vickersill, and was given to this city by the executors of the Judge, who represented it in Parliament for some fifteen years.

A COMPARISON.—Kingston has about 14,500 people; Watertown about 10,000. Kingston is asked for \$13,000 for schools; Watertown has just passed its school budget at \$18,000, about double in comparison.

A CHICKEN SWINDLE.—Says the Cape Vincent Eagle: "It is not one way it is another. The latest swindle on farmers is the chicken swindle. An agent calls on the farmer to purchase his chickens, for some foreign market, offering \$10 down, makes out what is supposed to be a contract for the delivery of the chickens, but what in a month or two turns up as a note for as many dollars as he sold chickens, and it being in the hands of an innocent purchaser, he has to pay over."

WIND WAFTS. FROM VARIOUS SOURCES AND ON VARIOUS THEMES. —The Saratonia arrived at Fox River at 2.30 p.m. —Piston's civic holiday occurs on the 6th of August.

—The excursion to the Cape to-morrow will be made by the "Pierpont." —Mark Twain (Mr. Clemens) passed west per Grand Trunk yesterday.

—Mr. J. Perry, of Cape Vincent, has leased the hotel at Saratoga Lake, Ont. —The C. M. church, of Pictou, has an excursion to the Thousand Island Park to-morrow.

—The Crossman House at Alexandria Bay is to be enlarged by building an addition where the wing now stands. —Fred. Nicols, agent of the Industrial World, has been visiting the city in the interest of the journal which he represents.

—Application has been made for the incorporation of the "Deseronto Navigation Company," with headquarters at Mill Point. —Mr. James Swift is getting 60,000 railway ties for the N.Y.C. Railway on the Blanche River. The ties are shipped to Cape Vincent.

—Congealed water cost \$15 per ton in New York. Nearly \$15,000 worth was shipped from this port during the early part of the summer. —On the 3rd of August the first excursion to Niagara Falls occurs. The fare is extremely low as a reference to Folger & Hanley's advertisement will show.

—Stiles, the horse thief, carried with him a number of wigs, by which he managed to completely change his appearance, appearing as a youth, middle-aged or old man at pleasure. —The Telegram has been holding a jubilee. Cause—enlargement and expansion of business. The circulation of our contemporary has increased from 1,200 to 10,000 daily.

—The Hamilton Times speaks thus satirically of our City Fathers: "The Kingston City Council sits until near the bright light in the morning, and then does very little but talk." —A number of passengers who wished to take the steamer "Catharine" this morning were compelled to take the afternoon express. They regretted missing the view of the islands and rapids.

—The Grand Trunk RR. Company is making so many improvements at Point St. Charles that we fear the talk of removal of work shops hither was so much moonshine. What think you, Mr. Mayor? —A Brockville man wants to make a fasting match with Dr. Tanner for \$1,000 or \$4,000. The Brockville man may be like a genius we know of. He wanted to bet \$10,000 on one occasion, and couldn't actually produce 10 cents if asked to do so.

Police Court. Fletcher Johnson, of Smith's Falls, answered to a charge of drunkenness. Discharged—first offence. J. Williams, of the lesser Birmingham, was admonished and discharged for a similar offence. Elizabeth Brown, drunk and disorderly, was fined \$1 and costs or five days in gaol.

Two licensed liquor dealers were summoned before the court for selling liquor within prohibited hours. The offences were proven and each was fined \$20 and costs. J. Mockridge and McLean Charlton were before the tribunal for allowing offensive matter to remain upon their premises. The police officers seemed to have been a little hasty in shoving the summons through, the necessary notice, under-by-law, not having been given, and in consequence the charge was dismissed.

Ann Parsons was fined \$1 and costs for pouring water upon the head of Mary Lowry.

Irish Relief Fund. Last spring an amateur company in Pictou gave an entertainment for the benefit of the Irish Relief Fund, the net profits of which were \$1122. The amount was sent by Mr. Walter T. Ross to the Duchess of Marlborough, accompanied by a letter in which the utmost sympathy was expressed for those whom the money was intended to relieve.

Mr. Ross received not only a letter of thanks from the Secretary of the Relief Committee, but an acknowledgment from Her Grace. The Pictou Times remarks that "it must be very gratifying to Mr. Ross, as well as to the ladies and gentlemen who so cordially assisted him in his charitable scheme, to find that though the sum realized was comparatively small their efforts have met with such a kind and hearty appreciation from so high a source."

School Matters. Mr. A. Marling, Secretary of the Department of Education, has issued notices to the effect: (1) That the first term in the Model School will begin on Monday, Aug. 30th and end on Saturday, Oct. 23rd. The closing examination will begin on Thursday, Oct. 21st or Friday, 22nd, at the option of the several County Boards of examiners. (2) The second term of the Model School will begin on Monday, Oct. 25th, and end on Saturday, Dec. 18th. The closing examination will begin on Thursday, Dec. 16th or Friday 17th.

The work prescribed in English Literature for intermediate examination in July, 1881, are: "Scott's Lady of the Lake," with special reference to Canto v and vi, and "Addison's Sir Roger de Coverley," as reprinted by W. & R. Chambers.

STEAMER ACCIDENT. An accident happened to the steamer "Corinthian" yesterday which hindered the vessel from proceeding on her way to Montreal. When a short distance below Saratoga Heights the cross-head at the beam of the engine broke. It was seen at once that the passage could not be continued. The break was strengthened by some gear, and the "Corinthian" steamed slowly back to Toronto. The Globe says it may require a couple of days to repair the break, and it will cause a delay of one day in the movements of the steamer. There was no unusual commotion among those on board by the mishap. The passengers were landed, and such of the crew as were forwarded by the Grand Trunk to their respective destinations.

RECENT ARRIVALS.—MR. BOWELL'S GRAIN REGULATIONS.—BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT. Passed through the Canal for Kingston: Schr. Mediterranean, Toledo, what. The schr. Jessie Macdonald came in light from Charlotte, and is now loading lumber at the foot of Clarence street. Freight on wheat from Detroit to Kingston is quoted at 7 to 7 1/2 cents, from Toledo 7c on corn and 7 1/2c on wheat. Arrivals at Swift's—Steamers Prussia, from Chicago; Cuba, from Ogdenburg; Armenia, from Toronto; Spartan, from Montreal. The prop. Prussia passed down this morning with a party of excursionists from Port Dalhousie and St. Catharines bound for Montreal. Some people may imagine that Hon. Mr. Bowell has not been informed of the effect of the imposition of duty on damaged grain, but such is not the case. WHIGGERS. —Miss Mary Anderson has gone to the Cliff House, at Sea Cliff. —Thirty-nine deaths have occurred from yellow fever in Rio Janeiro during two weeks. —Over four hundred Chinamen recently arrived at Victoria, B.C. from the land of the Celestials. —Capt. Murray has obtained the Government contract for dredging Toronto harbor at \$7,500. —Quebec workmen duped to New York, where they were offered half the wages promised, have returned. —The sexton of a Brooklyn church knocked down the organist on Tuesday because the latter had said that he told a lie. —Mr. Froude was among those who strongly opposed the Westminster monument to Prince Louis Napoleon from the first. —The Legislature of Victoria has passed a vote of want of confidence in the Ministry, who, it is said, will at once resign. —The amount for the New Brunswick railway, two million dollars, by American capitalists, is to be paid before October 1st. A young lady, on being asked where her native place was, replied: "I have none, I am the daughter of a Methodist minister."

—Chancellor Haven is said to have added \$100,000 to the endowment fund of Syracuse University by his personal efforts. —Dr. Tanner will never be arrested as a vagrant. He may not have any visible means of support, but then he doesn't need any. —The Hancock-English ratification meeting in New York, on Wednesday night, was the largest gathering of the kind ever held in that city. —Should the Car of Russia's new yacht, the Livadia, prove trustworthy in heavy weather, her model is to be used for a fleet for Atlantic ocean travel. —The new fly pest, which blows a maggot about 2 of an inch in length and is generally found in mangold crops, is farming in England. —Mr. Gladstone always insists on having seven hours' sleep a day, and eight if possible, and sips tea as a narcotic at 2 o'clock in the morning, after his night's work is over. —Rev. Mr. Chastney, a former Unitarian clergyman, has been expelled from the Masonic Lodge at Evanston, Ill., for denying the existence of God. This action is causing a good deal of excited discussion. —The number of marriages of divorced persons in England is steadily increasing. It is not large, though, only one hundred and seven annually at the latest accounts, out of a total of one hundred and ninety thousand. —The Ottawa Herald editorially announced that previous to Sir John Macdonald's departure for England all his colleagues tendered their resignations, so as not to embarrass him in his reorganization of the Cabinet. —Silver to the amount of \$18,000,000 has accumulated at the San Francisco mint, and the Secretary of the Treasury intends to make an effort to move some of it east. To this end he will advertise for proposals for the transportation of the dollars, and let the contract to the lowest bidder.
