A good authority states that it seems probable that the Americans will not be able to find a market in Europe during the coming season for more than about 150,000,000 bushels of the surplus men tioned as available for export; other words there - ill probably be a balance of 100,000,000 bushels of American grain for which there will be no de mand, a result disastrous for the far mere of the United States and Canada as it means low prices for the wheat offered for sale both in the home and foreign market.

The Mail of yesterday printed a lengthy letter from Mr. J. A. Allen in favor of his son, Mr. Grant Allen, who was an applicant for the Classical chair of Toronto University, and who certainly possesse credentials of a very high and commend able character. Signiftaneously, how ever, with the publication of the letter the announcement was made that Mr Hutton had been appointed to the position. Mr. Allen may be annoyed, and may again write sharply of Mr. Crooks, but his non-success in this case will not disconcert him. He has intimated "that when another post offers in the University, which he thinks his son can fill with benefit to the country and himself, he again intends applying for it, whatever party be in power." Mr. Allen evidently believes that persistence is profitable.

Now the Local Government makes the appointment (of jailers) filter through themselves, having recently procured an Act by which their consent is necessary before the appointee is confirmed in his appointment. By this means they have not only usurped an accient usage, but compelled the Sheriffs to make such a selection as they may approve. - London Free Press.

TORONTO UNIVERSITY. Hon. A. Crooks, Minister of Educa tion, has written what is practically a defence of the course pursued by him in regard to the appointment of a Classical Professor for Toronto University. In this so called 'memorandum' he traces the circumstances which imposed upon him so important a duty, the directness of his responsibility being manifested at the very outset of the change, and the pending controversy being the best evidence that it is not likely to decrease-Having sketched the characteristics of education in former years, he notes the fact, that when the Executive Council was constituted the Education Department the opportunity, for the first time in this Province, was presented of properly adjusting the respective functions of the University and the High and Publie Schools "so that the work of each should find its proper point of contact and not overlap." In 1877 the curricalum of study, in connection with Toronto University, was carefully revised, and as a result there were higher standards fixed for the various departments.
