THE DEATH RECORD.—As the persons who are required to register deaths with the clerk of the municipality have in many cases neglected their duty, the following section of the Act bearing on the one is given: "The person required to register a death is the physician who may have attended the deceased professionally during his or her last illness, the occupier of the house in which the death occurs, and the coroner who may have attended any inquest held on such person, and the return must be made before the interment of the body. Any clergyman or other person performing any religious service for the burial of a dead body without receiving a certificate that the particulars of the death of such person have been registered, is also required to make a return thereof within seven days after such burial." Neglect to make these reports renders the guilty person liable to a fine of \$20 and costs.

THE OTTAWA DESTINATION DISPUTE.—This matter has assumed a phase of importance it should never have reached. As far as this journal is concerned, we have only to remark that its original complaint against our contemporary was, that it had gone out of its way (as we believe) to have an unwarranted and petty thing at Sir John Macdonald, in the matter of alleged negligence of the deputation. As a matter of justice, and in the light of recent developments, we acquit it of any such intention, as it believed it was justified in saying what it did.—News.

KINGSTON POST-OFFICE.—Mr. Henry Goodfellow, one of the best clerks in the Postal service, desiring a change of duty, has been granted a removal from the Kingston Post Office to the railway mail service in the eastern townships. An exchange is made with Mr. Campbell, of Glangary, who assumes the post vacated, and will remove to Kingston. Therefore there will be no new appointment or other changes in the Kingston office. Mr. Goodfellow will be much missed in the church circles as well as in the Post Office.

ANTI-SPIRITUALISM.—This evening Prof. Randolph and Professor Cecil will give an entertainment of the spiritualistic order in the Victoria Music Hall. They come to Kingston highly recommended, and quite prepared to expose the humbug in which so many people, apparently believers, are so deeply involved. They are to be congratulated on the day—a clever dupe to delude and deceive. THE TUBING TARIFF.—The Citizen says a member of the firm of Chaffey Bros., boat builders, Kingston, is at present in Ottawa for the purpose of urging objection to the duty on tubing. The Citizen further says that this Mr. Chaffey alleges "that unless the duty is removed the firm will remove their works across the border, as vessels are admitted into Canada free, whilst material used in their construction is subject to duty."

THE FIRE.—The loss by the fire in Montreal on Monday evening is estimated at \$25,000. A brother of Mr. J.D. Thompson, who was in Kingston at the time, was interested very largely in the burned building. He was visiting his friends here when the fire took place.

THE NORTHERN RAILWAY.—Mr. Cumberland, Manager of the Northern Railway, who has just returned from England, appeared before the Committee appointed to investigate the road's affairs on Tuesday last, and held a most interesting session. He said the Company's stock had declined to 50 and 48 per cent., and he feared this investigation would reduce it to bankruptcy again.

HOUSE AMUSEMENTS.—A package of rattles that made a loud noise, similar to a telegraph instrument or a lively locust, have been received by Messrs. Plumb and Donville and distributed among the Tories. On Wednesday for a few moments the air was deafened by their clatter as hon. members took lessons on them. Mr. Cheval brought out his jaw's harp, and amid roars of laughter, played an air which Mr. Donville is so tickled over the prospect to draw Mr. Cheval's music that he dances about like a boy with a new whistle. He is too happy to live, and almost walks on air. The Opposition is now likely to create a noise if they never did before.

THE LIGOR LAW.—The Napanee Standard says:—On Saturday, 10th March, the Inspector prosecuted another charge against Andrew Empey, of Odesa, of selling liquor without a license. The offence was alleged to have been committed on Monday, March 5th, and was clearly proven. Messrs. Williams and Webster, who heard the case, levied a fine on the offender of \$25 with \$9.40 costs, or the alternative of 30 days in gaol. He failed to pay or find security, and was unceremoniously dispatched for a month's imprisonment of duration vile, unless the fine with costs be sooner paid. An effort was made to arrange the matter, but the bench was inexorable.

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
