Russian Defeats.

The Poles in Austria Aiding Turkey.

Suggested Dismemberment of Turkey.

May 11, morning .- The aspect of matters at the seat of war is somewhat altered: The activity which has hitherto prevailed in Armenia seems to have been transferred to the line of the Danube. GENERAL WAR PROBABLE.

The Disastrous Russian Defeats.

Another Great Battle Coming

London, May 11. - The differences between England and Russia relative to the Eastern question are increasing, and an open rupture is probable. Should this occur England's neutrality could no longer be maintained, and would, it is believed, lead to a general European war. Reports from Constantinople give a disastrous defeat to the Russians while endeavouring to cross the Danube. The Turks claim that the Russians were completely routed with heavy loss. The Russian bridge boats were destroyed. There is great rejoicing in Constantinople. London, May 11 .- A despatch from Bucharest says the Russians are prepar ing to force the crossing of the Danube at three different places, viz. : Kalafat, Niedpolis and a point between Reni and Galatz. The Russian gunboats are notively bombarding all these points. The Russians are erecting batteries to de-
