My DEAR BISMOP, -I am anxious to learn from you whether there is any hope, as far as you are concerned, of my being relieved of the oversight of that portion of my Diocese which is contiguous to the city of Ottawa. You are probably aware that some division of the Diocese of Montreal has more than once been mooted; but it has met with no favor from me personally for two reasons first, because I could not quite approve of the manner in which the subject was taken up, and also because I still less approve of the actual division contemplated; namely, the elimination of the
