The Roy Case Resumed.

Ottawa, June 21.-After routine, Rev. Dr. Ryerson, by special request, delivered a brief address respecting the pamphlet of Rev. James Roy, and desired to be hostility to that gentleman, whom he had repeatedly defended, and on whose recommendation Mr. Roy had more than once been promoted. He also expressed great sympathy with the members of the committee to whom had been committed the painful task of acting in the matter. proceeded to show that Mr. Roy's pamphlet contained principles which are diametrically opposed to all civil and religious institutions; for instance, Mr. Roy's objection to any declaration of principles or binding obligations, as being inconsistent with perfect freedom of thought and action; such notions were attempted on the part of some of the Stuarts, but they were found subversive of the civil rights of the people; such notions would destroy the marriage vow. and do away with the oath of allegiance, &c. Mr. Roy protests against the pro fession of any particular article of religion, as to make such profession would oppose liberty of thought.
