Finally Dean became sick and was not able to eat anything. He died of starvation. The party had at this time reached the bank of Aigapuk river, twelve miles from Teller City, within the Arctic circle.

The day after Dean's death, Louis Reich and George Wood, who were prospecting in the neighborhood, were attracted by the peculiar cries of some one in distress. They made their way to the river bank and there discovered Huston and Thiers, who had cut the flesh from the body of Dean and were about to cook it. Th rescuers were just in time to prevent


