

#### A Durable Varaish.

To make jet black varnish that can be used for furniture or for small wood handles that will make them smooth, shining, hard and solid so that they will not get dim by handling or lose their gloss take of asphaltum 3 ounces, boiled oil 4 quarts, burnt umber 8 ounces and enough oil of turpentine to thin.

The three first named ingredients must be mixed and incorporated by the aid of heat; then take the mixture out of doors and away from the fire, and before it cools gradually add the turpentine.
