SURVEYOR'S WIFE AND A COLONEL'S GALLANTRY - PERSECUTING AN INNOCENT WOMAN,

Toronto, Sept. 4.—Some three years ago a Mrs. Francis, wife of a land surveyor near London, came to reside with her mother in Weston.
