### FRENCH CRISIS.

The French crisis still continues. Jules Ferry is having a hard time re constructing the Cabinet, and it is feared that he will not be able to so re organize it as to command the approvaof the Chamber of Deputies. Of Gambetta nothing is seen directly, but al. the German journals credit him with the authorship of the crisis which they also look upon as likely to threaten i not to undermine the pacific relations between France and Germany. To quiet this perturbance and to reassure the uneasiness of Germany and of Europe the Paris journals have adopted an ex ceptionally pacific tone and declare that as soon as the new Cabinet is formed a circular of a decidedly pacific character will be sent to the representatives of France abroad. This looks as though the policy of bluster was well named and that it was nothing more nor less than that. The policy of peace and moderation for which De Freycinet fell. will still be the policy of any French Government, and this vindication of his course cannot fail to be a source of satisfaction to the ex-Prime Minister of France, and a corresponding humiliation to Gambetta and the blusterers. ## THE ST. LAWRENCE ISLANDS.

There was something very peculiar about the sale, or rather the lease, of the Islands down the river the other day. The incidents of the auction and the facts which preceded it have a suspicions odor about them to say the leas of it. The principal oder announcing the sale was certainly withdrawn and the whole scheme of thus disposing of the islands was for the time being abandoned: Shortly afterwards; as it turns out, a microscopic advertisement was inserted in the newspapers announcing that the auction sale of the island leases would take place as per the first an nouncement. The withdrawal of the original adet, however, had switched many intending purchasers off their guard, and the subsequently small and obscure notice was in the press so short a time that many of those interested had no idea the sale was going on until the islands were disposed of and the names of purchasers appeared in print. A curious feature of this funny, affair is that a small coterie of interested gentlemen. mainly of one and the same political complexion, seem to have been kept duly posted as to the coming event and fyled a punctual attendance. Only a few persons, as we have said, were present, and these few mainly friends of the Government and of one another. This fact proved exceedingly pleasant and convenient to bidders, who got the islands at prices which bear no prothe value in as plea-We will not say that the unaccountable withdrawal of the first adet, and the subsequent appearance of a miniature form of it; was a trick. that there was any actual collusion be tween the Government officials and the purchasers, but, we repeat, the circum stances are exceedingly suspicious and point in the direction indicated. The names of the few purchasers are not of a character to dissipate the apprehension that there was something close and crooked about it. Among them figure Tory members and ex-members of Parliament, and others who might be ex pacted to be able to command a friend at court. It may be regarded as a small matter, and so it may yet prove to in the mean and contemptible sense to the sale or lease of any part of this beautiful domain of nature, but certainly if such were overruled, and it was ed to go on with the sale, there should have been no ugly baulk in the pearance of any ring in connection with it. This to me appears so very far from the truth that I do not think the statement should be allowed to go without contradiction, and no person can do so with as much knowledge of the facts connected with the river trade as I can, being Marine Inspector here for the last eleven years. As the Witto says, all the barges are not what they might be. This is always the case, when speaking of so large a number as there is used in the trade by the various companies But as a rule they are a better class of barges then what are used on any river navigation on this continent, and when I mention one fact connected with the trade it will set all the others at rest, namely, that the underwriters have not had to pay for one bushel of damaged grain conveyed from Kingston to Montreal in barges during the last two years, except in one barge which was run down by a steamer at Valleyfield it 1879, and the grain injured by the late accident in Lachine Canal, in which latter case the damage was caused by the unevenness of the bottom of the Canal when the water left the loaded barges aground. I do not think that any Forwarding Companies or individual carriers can show any better record than our river forwarders can for conveying grain with safety. Yours truly.

ARCTIC EXPEDITION.

A Polar Search Attended with Many Difficulties. New York, Sept. 23,-The Herald's New Bedford special says the members of the Franklin search, under the command of Lieut. Schwatha, were picked up by Capt. Baker of the Bark George and Mary, of New Bedford, at Depot Islan I on 1st of Aug., they having returned to that point from their sledge ourney to King William land on the 4th March of the present year. sledge journey was the longest ever made through the unexplored Arctic region, the party having been absent from the base of operations in the Hudson Bay Il months and four days, and travelled 325 miles, the only sledge journey ever made that covered the entire Arctic winter. The expedition successfully withstood the greatest cold ever encountered by white men. On January 3rd the thermometer sank to 100 2 be low freezing point. During the summer and fall of 79 they made a complete search of King William land adjacent to the mainland, travelling over the route pursued by the crews of "Ere bus" and "Terror"upon their retreat toward Backs river and buried the bones all those unfortunately remain above ground, and erected monuments. Their research established the fact that the records of the Franklin expedition are lost beyond recovery. The Esquimaux, who had found a sealed tin box filled with books where the last survivor of Franklin's party are supposed to have finally perished, were interviewed. These natives broke open the box and threw out the precious records, which were then either scattered or destroyed by the children. They also made known that one of Franklin's ships drifted down the Victoria Straits

and was unwillingly scuttled by Oak Joolim. The Esquimaux found it near an Island off Grant Point during the progress is very slow. Spring of 1849. At that time one man was dead in the steerage. During the same year the natives saw the track of four white men in the Spring snows on the mainland.
