Gallops Rapids.

The chain gang drilled and fired two
holes to-day, twelve feet deep in the
pitch in the Gallops Rapids, the swiftest
part. They drilled the lower six
feet in sixteen minutes. They have
seventeen hundred pounds of dynamite
on hand and expect that the drilling and
blasting will work successfully in the
swiftest water. Two explosives on
each side are used for guys, and the
"Wren" and "Sarah Daley" soon
carry away the rocks which are lifted
from the bottom with a dredge.
