The enormous majority of 60,000 by which Colquit, the Democratic Gover nor, of Georgia has been re-elected is a fresh proof that the solid South is going to support the Democratic nomination for the Presidency by a larger majority than ever. It was the hope of Northern Republicans when, as a war measure, the slaves of the South were emancipated, that considerations of gratitude would for years, if not for ever. attach the negro vote to the Republican cause. In this the Republican party has been disappointed. It would be impossible for Democratic candidates t poll such tremendous majorities in the South without the aid of a large color ed vote. The freed-men certainly must largely co-operate with the Democrats in order to the maintenance of the De mocratic ascendancy, and though North eru Republicans may deem this shall bily ungrateful it certainly argues that the two races are on passably good term when they thus are found politically cooperating together.

There cannot be much vitality o generosity in the Fenian organization when its members and sympathizers would permit its founder, Head Centre Stephens, to languish in a destitute and starving condition on the streets of New York. A great many eloquent diatribes have been levelled against the cruelty of permitting Irish "patriots" of the Fenian Order to languish in British bastiles, but the fate of Stephens, at large in free America, would seem just as much entitled to commiseration Surely a portion of the skirmishing fund collected by O'Donnovan Rossa and others would be just as laudably applied in relieving the physical wants of this reduced Fenian leader and founder as in the crack-brained scheme of blowing up with dynamite the British nation and government, The fate of Stephens is a warning to ardent Irish patriots who fancy they are destined to liberate their native land by perfectly impracticable and contraband methods

SYNDICATES AND THE PEOPLE

This is surely the age of syndicates Nothing evidently can be done, of any size or moment, and nothing hereafter can be run except by means of a syndicate. One of these combinations has been successfully formed for the construction of the Panama Canal. Sir John Macdonald has informed the country that he has one ready to build the Grain Drill, Masson Manufacturing Canada Pacific, and the cantagious example of these larger concerns seems be spreading to many enterprises smaller proportions. Emulating the example of his Dominion chieftain the Premier of Quebec contemplates the leasing of all the Government railways. of that province to associations of capitalists among whom there appears to be a mania, which time may cure, for obtaining control of railways already built, or for the construction of projec ted lines. In imitation of the Domin ion situation there are rumours of an early and emergent session of the Que bec House, to consummate or ratify the policy proposed. The Montreal Star thus gives voice to a strong public jection in many quarters to this relinquishment at once of government pro perty and responsibility: "We must confess to a feeling of disap

> Cabinet upon this question. We had hoped that the Government would have taken the position that its railways should be worked entirely in the interest of the people. Of course, it may be urged that leasing the roads to a syndicate is the very best means of accomplishing this end, but it will be difficult to demonstrate such an assump tion. The history of railway management in the United States proves conclusively the necessity for Government interference in the interests of the people, and the tendency in Canada among our railway men is to follow American precedent. Why then should the Government of the Province take a backward step in putting the Provincial roads in the hands of men who may use them to the loss of the people? Why should the roads not be managed "by the people for the people?" Some weeks ago we pointed out how the roads might be judiciously operated by a commission elected directly by the people, and how the Cabinet might thus divest itself of the difficulty in connection with the dispensation of patronage. We trust Mr.Chapleau will insist upon "official" propositions before taking any action, and that such propositions will be made public a sufficient time before the opening of Parliament to allow of their thorough discussion by the people as well as their representatives. The leasing of the roads, if it must be done, is a question which should be calmly and thoughtfully discussed and the people will look to the Cabinet to take them thoroughly into its confidence before in any way or manner committing

A MUCH NEEDED AMENDMENT.

Opponents of Provincial Government like Mr. Baker, M.P.P. for Russell, and Mr. Beaty, M.P. for West Toronto. urge that the sessions of the Local Houses are largely occupied with useless tinkering, done, we admit, not only in our Provincial Assemblies, but in our Federal Parliament as well. But we are very far from regarding the bulk of either, assembly as useless or unnecessary. On the contrary in this age progress it is impossible that the legislation of one era, or of one year, should be exactly adapted to the future, and much of the amendment which our laws undergo is very properly intended to bring those enactments into harmony with the requirements of the times, and to correct the defects by which experience, the only true test, has shown those laws to be characterized. These remarks are especially true of our educational legislation, and as this matter is wholly relegated to our Provincial Legislatures by the Federal constitution, we are disposed to award credit rather than bame to our Local House for its unceasing endeavours to keep our public school and general educational system abreast of the times. In trying to do so it is possible, nay it is inevitable, hat well-meant changes may prove e mistakes, and we certainly think our Ontario Parliament made one of these when it invested the City Councils with a veto-power over the action of the School Board in the matter of expenditure for the enlargement of school accommodation. In this matter we do not question the motives or intentions which prompted this piece of unfortunate legislation. It was done for the purpose of affording the people a check on the possible extravagance of Public School Boards, although we cannot see why the electors had not already in their possession a much more effective check upon the School Trustees, who are as directly their representatives as are the Aldermen at the Council Board. As if conscious that the Council was no more to be entrusted with the veto power than were the trustees with unrestricted expenditure, the proviso was cautiously inserted that by nothing less than a two-thirds vote of the Council could such an application from the School Board he refused. This precaution was

IRISH STATISTICS.

Lightening the Labour Market and i Likely Results.

New York Herald. A glance at the statistics of Ireland

will show that Nature herself is endea vouring to effect a cure, and that if sh is but left alone small holdings will before another quarter of a century has clapsed have disappeared from Ireland. In 1841 there existed 310,436 farms of from one to five acres, and 252,799 farm from five to fifteen acres apiece. In 1878 these numbers had been reduced to 66,859 and 163,062. On the other hand the number of farms of fifteen to thirty acres had increased in the same interval from 48,625 to 161,264. Since the Land Act. established a special system of protection for small holdings the rate of progress in this direction has naturally tended to fall off. Progress, however, continues nevertheless, and Ireland in due time will be cured of her sore of being pauperized in spite of the doctors. NAVAL DISPLAY.

European Concert-Attempt to Frighten the Sultan.

Portsmouth, Oct. 9 .- The troopship which sails on the 18th instant takes 50 tons of ammunition and 54 Nordenfeld and Gatling guns for the Mediterranean.
