Chicago Tribune. The Rev. Dr. Cleary, of Dungaryan Ireland, has been appointed Roman Catholic Bishop of Kingston, Canada. He was for several years connected with the Roman Catholic College parish priest of Dungarvan. During his pastorate there, however, he has had occasion to do an act which might well be copied by ecclesiastics elsewhere. Dungaryan returns a member to the British Parliament.
