MISSED MONEY.—The Central Board of Missions of the C. M. Church met at Montreal yesterday. It was directed that the appropriations be made on the following basis: Salary for a married minister \$750, for a single ordained minister \$400, for an unordained minister \$300 per annum, these amounts to be exclusive of house rent, moving expenses and claims on the children's fund. Should the amount of money at the disposal of the Board not be sufficient to reach those figures, a percentage will be struck off the appropriations, as the Society is resolved to keep the expenditure within its income.

Irving, together with the officers, were appointed a General Committee, with the President, Vice-President and Mr. Hamilton to be also an Executive Committee.

The joining fee was fixed at \$6 for ordinary members, a reduction of \$5 being made in favor of University and B.M. College students. Several new members were proposed and accepted.
