The Free Trade squintings of our co temporary are attracting considerable attention, and we should not wonder before long they should elicit the monitions of its political masters. more than one occasion our neighbor has shocked its party confreres by giving expression to fiscal heresies, going private energy and enterprise are the foundation of successful commerce, thus casting suspicion upon the theory that these things can be created by act of parliament. The farmers were certainly told, they were repeatedly assured, that the national policy would give them better prices for the products of their fields. We see it stated that barley has gone down just one hundred per cent. in price in the county of Dundas under the N. P. and with a Tory representation of the county in Parliament. Barley brought one dollar per bushel in revenue tarifi times, it is now selling there at fifty cents. It is idle to attempt to explain a fact like this in the faces of the hollow promises which were made to our farmers in 1878. During the depression all the troubles of the time were most unjustly saddled upon the Liberal Government, and definite promises made for higher prices and better times once the Tories were replaced in power. This marked decleusion in the price of grain should be sufficient to convince every unprejudiced farmer of the extent of the fraud which so many of them were consenting parties to at the last Dominio
